# PREPARE

### **ENGAGE**

Engage Tasks are the core of the MA Law (Conversion). This is via workshops for attendance students. They are an opportunity for you to review your knowledge, test your understanding, debate and develop ideas, analyse problem questions, get general feedback and advice from lecturers and develop communication and teamwork skills

- Attempting tasks in a group setting
- Attempting Single Best Answer Questions
- Receiving tailored lecturer feedback.
